I hope you have had a good time during this wettest of summers. It was pleasing that we had no major floods and any minor drain blockages were quickly dealt with by Cornwall's emergency teams.

Congratulations

The Town must congratulate Mr. Whipp, our Town Crier, who has won three competitions for best dressed Town Crier. Well done Brian and his wife Monica. The Town has won the Caradon Town in Bloom shield. This prize is awarded by the South East Cornwall Tourist Association annually to the town with the best presentation not just because the location is pretty. Our thanks for winning this prestigious award must go to many people, but I shall mention Councillor Sue Hooper for encouraging the Town Council to fund money for plants and labour, STIG for Fore Street cleaning and hanging baskets and SEA for the work in Victoria Gardens and the vegetables in Fore Street.

Wanted

There are recruitment drives for clubs all the time. I must, however, advertise two clubs for young people. The St John Ambulance are about to start increasing their numbers of young people in early Winter. Unhelpful

Cornwall Council has announced that it will close the toilets at the waterfront. The Town Council is undertaking discussions with Cornwall.

Stagnation

Cornwall Council is not responding to our communications on TocH, the allotment site at Grenfell Avenue, the land behind the Coop car park and the Maurice Huggins room.

Snail Pace Progress

The weed killing in Fore Street area and the town as a whole does not seem to have been too successful. The Town Council is organizing a limited weed cleaning using people who are fulfilling community payback with the Probation Service. Cornwall has made some responses to our request for help on the Local Plan but has not given dates for training.

Improvements

The Town will have **free parking** every day from 1st December to the end of Christmas and every Saturday and Sunday until the end of March. No. 4 Fore St. will open for mini market stalls shortly after it is refurbished by the Saltash CIC.

Still to Come

Thanks for all suggestions for the Maurice Huggins room. Details of progress will be announced shortly. On the 11th November, along with all the Nation, the Town will remember the dead and casualties of all wars in particular the two World Wars. Saltash Celtic Cross Nears Completion

The three year project to erect a giant contemporary interpretation of a Celtic Cross at the Cornwall end of the Tamar Bridge is nearly complete, with an official national launch planned early in the New Year. The £550,000 project is funded by the National Lottery Community Spaces programme, with financial support from Cornwall Council and Saltash Town Council, and is rated by the Lottery as one of the most important in the UK.

The project is led by Saltash Waterfront Residents Association, and started life as a means of opening up two acres of neglected woodland at the Gateway to Cornwall. Vice Chair Joe Ellison says "Although the Lottery supported the idea, they said it needed a "Wow" factor. We then remembered the design for a 20 metre modern Celtic Cross created by Cornish sculptor Simon Thomas for the Millennium, and contacted Simon. With strong support from Eden founder Tim Smit and Cornwall Chief Executive Kevin Lavery, the project began nearly three years ago, and is now endorsed by financial support from Prince Charles, Duke of Cornwall".

Work on the woodland has now almost finished, and maintenance and future community involvement will be managed by SWRA in conjunction with Cornwall Wildlife Trust. There are plans to establish an orchard of old Cornish apple trees, planting about November, to reflect the heritage of the site. Next year, there will also be wildlife walks and activities for young people, such as Forest Schools in school holidays.

Meanwhile, fabrication of the Cross is well advanced at the RAF St Mawgan factory of Gateguards UK, in a former Tornado hangar. Gateguards are better known for their full scale replicas of WW II Spitfires and Mustangs. The Cross, on a similar scale to the Angel of the North, is built using advanced boat building glass and carbon fibre technologies. Whilst it weighs less than 3 tonnes, the sheer scale of the Cross means that transport to the prepared piled base alongside the Tamar Bridge will need to go via the A30 to Exeter, rather than use the shorter but twisty A38 route through the Glynn valley. The installation, probably in December, should be a truly spectacular event.

The Cross will be the first thing to be seen by visitors into Cornwall, and we also hope to access funding for a sensitive up lighting scheme. Based on the experience of the Angel of the North, it has the potential to bring enormous economic benefits to Cornwall in general and to Saltash in particular as an iconic tourist destination.

Application forms are available from the Guildhall or the Town Council website <u>www.saltash.gov.uk/data transparency.php</u> The simple form has various conditions, principally that the community group should be based in Saltash and possess a constitution and set of audited accounts. The group itself should at least part fund the purpose of the grant, which must be approved, and acknowledge the Town contribution in publicity.

The Saltash Town Centre Improvement Group Update

The STIG continues to work on projects for the benefit of the Town Centre – highlights over the summer have been:

Phase II of Hanging Baskets – in Olympic/Union colours to celebrate the two major events of the summer – this year's baskets are bigger, brighter and better!

Free Parking Saturdays – a very popular move amongst traders, locals and visitors; this continues to run until the end of November.

In progress is the 'Town App' for Smart Phones and improved signage, and ongoing investigations into a 'Talking Bench' and possible partial street coverings.

Phase III of projects, which should go forward for funding approval shortly, is hoped to include, amongst other projects: Christmas Free Parking in December, like last year Winter Hanging Baskets

The Town Council also has a 9m x 6m stage that can be borrowed.

Also, some of the existing community groups, such as Mayfair and Regatta, have assets that were bought with the aid of previous grants from Saltash Town Council. These may be borrowed by other groups, subject to agreement from the group concerned and a commitment to make good any damage. For instance, the Regatta committee has several hundred metres of bunting, "prayer" flags and walkie-talkies. Saltash Town Council has a list of assets.
