A Time to Celebrate!

This year marks the 60th anniversary of The Queen's accession to the throne. And with the Olympics in July, this summer promises to be time of celebrations. The festivities kick off early in Saltash, though, as we are particularly fortunate to be one of only 20 communities in Cornwall where the Olympic Flame will be carried in a Relay on the first day of its journey to the Opening Ceremony. Read on to find out more about our celebrations.

Picnic in the Park in Longstone Park on Sunday 3 June, from 2pm

Building on the already popular Big Lunch initiative run by the Eden Project, Saltash Town Council will host a Picnic in the Park. Bring your picnic and share time with neighbours and friends. Music and entertainment will be provided, but anyone wishing to organise games is invited to contact Saltash Town Council.

The Olympic Flame in Saltash on Saturday May 19th

The first Torchbearer will set off from the Burraton crossroads at 19:15. The Torch will be carried along Callington Road and down Fore Street. It will cross the bridge over the A38 before going over the Tamar Bridge at 19:30. Come and line the Route to cheer on the Torch. But there are plenty of other ways you can join in ! They are all FREE and you do not need to book in advance.

Be a Torchbearer !

Students at Saltash.net Community School have designed our very own Salt Torch. Come and carry it aloft on a lap, or two, of Saltmill Park. The Salt Torch Relay will run from 7am to 7pm.

Competition to Design a Torch

Your torch can be of any medium. It must be no smaller than 50cm and no larger than 100cm, and it should not carry a naked flame. Please design your torch so it can be hung on a wall and bring it to Saltash Library by May 5th. All torches will be displayed in the Church of St. Nicholas and St. Faith on the day of the Torch Relay, and the winners will be invited to accompany the Mayor as he waves the Olympic Flame out of Cornwall!

A Day of Sport (10am to 4pm)

Various venues throughout town are offering taster sessions in a sport. Free Passports will be available at all the venues. You'll get a stamp for each session you've completed, and the first 50 people to fill their passport will receive a specially-commissioned Olympic coin. A Day of Music and Arts

A day brimming over with music and arts starts at 10am in Longstone Park. Local musical talent will be showcased, but there will also be sessions to reflect the cultural diversity of the Olympics, such as Japanese taiko drumming ,a tango dance workshop and an energetic Cornish bluegrass band will play to get us in the mood to cheer on the Olympic Torch. The entertainment focus shifts to the Waterside after the Torch has gone with an outdoor theatrical extravaganza, a mass choir and other musical entertainment.

Help Saltash set a World Record for the world's largest Tai Chi lesson

Be in Longstone Park at 5pm and be counted as Saltash attempts to set a World Record. The teacher will focus on breathing techniques in this 30-minute Tai Chi Qi Gong lesson, so anyone of any age or any physical ability can participate. You do not need any prior experience of Tai Chi and you do not need to register in advance. You'll be able to tell your grandchildren that on the day the Olympic Torch passed through Saltash you helped set a World Record !

With Toddler Games on the green by Ashtorre Rock, an Alternative Games for people with limited mobility at the Wesley Church and a football tournament at Saltmill it promises to be a day to remember. New Waste and Recycling Arrangements

Cornwall Council has introduced an entirely new single waste contract for Cornwall, to replace the six separate contracts of the former District Councils. The contract has been won by the multinational William Cory company and will save at least £2 million each year of the five year contract. The changes are radical, and are inevitably leading to a multitude of problems during the initial changeover weeks.

Cornwall's Cory call centre is currently receiving over 7,000 calls per day, and complainants must expect to be on a call hold system for up to an hour, despite the centre recruiting an extra 60 call handlers. Saltash Town Council hopes the system will have improved drastically by the time the Messenger goes to press, but in the meantime if you have a query about the new arrangements: call in to the One Stop Shop at Saltash Library, e-mail refuseandrecycling@cornwall.gov.uk,

Saltash Lions May Fair Committee decided to hold May Fair in Warfelton Sports Field off Callington Road this year. The wide open space has allowed them to put on a much grander affair, and we now have a full-blown carnival weekend to look forward to. Saltash Town Band will start the festivities at 10 a.m. on Saturday, May 5th when a full Civic Parade will begin from St Anne's home followed by the Mayor's Parade of Youth. All children are invited to join this parade through Warfelton Field to circle the arena for the Mayor's official opening.

The usual food, craft and charity stalls will line the field. The Fancy Dress Contest on Saturday morning has a choice of Olympic or Diamond Jubilee themes. Saltash Town Band will start the day's musical performances, which includes Wreckers Morris, and there will be Punch & Judy, face painting, a bouncy castle and Elfic the jester with circus workshops for children. Don't miss the highlights of the day: a Field Gun Run contest by the Sea Cadets, followed by the Arrow Barrows! For our teens and young adults, there will be a MUSIC FEST on the neighbouring Saltash United football field on Saturday afternoon and evening organised by Live Wire Youth Project.

Sunday sees a full day of entertainment, beginning with our Saltash Trotters Half-Marathon and Fun Run. Mark's Magic Show is a *must see* and there will be an It's-a- Knock-Out competition in the afternoon hosted by Callington Lions Club. There is also a Photography Contest for digital pictures taken at Saltash Lions May Fair.

Elwell Woods and the Celtic Cross – an update

Following three successful Volunteer Days organised by SWRA residents association, the woods are clear of rubbish, ivy and brambles. Work is proceeding apace in the woodlands, and should be finished at the end of April. Traditional skills are being used to make walls safe, and improve pathways, and the top area has been cleared for an orchard of traditional Cornish apple trees and maybe a vegetable area, reflecting the former uses of this recent woodland.

Meanwhile, the fabrication of the Simon Thomas Cross (20 metres tall) is taking place in factory units at Bristol and Newquay Airport. The composite design is in glass and carbon fibre, incorporating copper powder in the resin for a verdigris effect. Erection should take place in October.

Two new information boards will be installed shortly opposite the Drill Hall and at the entrance to the woods below, showing detailed Cross and Landscape designs and information.

Dog Fouling: The Council's Powers Dog Fouling is always a contentious issue, and is a concern at the moment for many residents in Saltash: although the vast majority of dog owners act responsibly and clear up after their pets, some do not, affecting amenity and hygiene for everyone. SWRA residents association has a particular name and shame campaign in progress on the Waterside Providing dog bins, and organising enforcement against owners who do not use them, is legally the responsibility of Cornwall Council. However the Town Council has recently sent three staff on a training course to qualify them to issue fixed penalty notices for dog fouling.
