PUTTING YOUNG PEOPLE FIRST

Following the loss of wider funding for youth work provision, Saltash Town Council has stepped in to enable and develop this vital work in our community. Saltash charities Livewire, The Core (formerly K3) and Groundwork have been awarded sums totalling £40K between them to take forward professional youth work catering for those young people most in need of support. The three organisations came forward in response to advertising of the opportunity, and went through a procurement process to ensure high-impact use of the funding for maximum benefit to young people in our town.



We are delighted at Livewire to have received this crucial funding from Saltash Town Council to ensure the excellent and valuable work at Livewire continues. I believe it will also help to develop a more joined

up approach to youth work in the town, ensuring more young people are able to access a wider range of provision.



Cllr James Shepherd (pictured, below), who spearheaded the proposal last summer to include youth work funding provision within the town's precept, quickly galvanised support from the rest of the Council, leading to approval early this year. As James states: "The contract is dependent on match funding, and so the town and its young people will be getting a lot of value from the budgeted amount." The level of experience and breadth of skills across the three organisations means that the funding provides

four and a half open access sessions per week, workshops on issues including alcohol and drug abuse, sexual health, legal highs and mental health problems, as well as outreach work designed to hook young people into ongoing support.
