Free Parking Success

This December the Saltash Town-centre Improvement Group (STIG) pioneered a first for Cornwall – a free parking scheme for the whole run up to Christmas. From 1st-24th December parking was totally free every day from 10am in Saltash's four town centre car parks. This was aimed at boosting trade in the town centre for the critical Christmas period.

Over two-thirds of town centre traders surveyed said that the scheme had noticeable increased trade (none said that it had been reduced). Numerous members of the public also gave positive feedback, and Saltash got excellent publicity on both ITV Westcountry and BBC Spotlight. One trader told the interviewer that trade had 'almost doubled' expected trade, whilst another stated that the scheme had made up for an otherwise difficult year.

There has been interest in the scheme from all over Cornwall, and the Town Council, as part of the STIG, is now considering various follow-up options for car parking. This may include running the scheme again for Christmas 2012, and possible other parking schemes aimed at boosting town centre trade.

Elwell Woods and the Celtic Cross

2012 will be the year when the 20 metre Celtic Cross is built, and when Elwell Woods will be fully accessible to Saltash residents and visitors. There has been a great deal of activity during the last six months, and a highly professional team is in place to implement the plans overwhelmingly approved by the general public nearly two years ago.

- Three companies are currently tendering for the fabrication of the carbon and glass fibre Cross and a contractor will be selected by the end of January.
- Glendale (formerly Silvanus) have been selected to carry out the woodland management works and
 improvement to the paths within the woods. They will start before the end of January, aiming to finish before
 the bird nesting season begins most of the substantial ash and sycamore trees within the woods will remain,
 and selective replanting of mature trees is planned, including a Cornish apple orchard.
- Concurrently, the Tamar Bridge Committee will improve the steep and boggy perimeter footpath around the woods so that access is improved.

THE TEAM IS KEEN TO ENCOURAGE COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT IN THE WOODLAND AND A VOLUNTEER WEEKEND WILL TAKE PLACE ON THE WEEKEND OF **JANUARY 28th and 29th**. SATURDAY WILL BE MAINLY FOR YOUNG PEOPLE, SUNDAY MAINLY FOR ADULTS, WORKING UNDER SUPERVISION OF GLENDALE.

The objective will be to clear rubbish and remove tangled undergrowth, so volunteers should bring heavy duty gardening gloves and rakes.

Olympic Torch to be carried through Saltash on Saturday May 19th

The Flame for the London Olympics will be lit in a ceremony involving maidens and a parabola in ancient Olympia in Greece. From there, it will be flown to the UK and carried in relay by 8000 Torchbearers across the country on a 70-day journey to the Opening Ceremony, where it will be used to light the cauldron at the Opening Ceremony.

Cornwall has been selected to host the first day of the Relay. The eyes of the world will be on Land's End when the Torch Relay sets off at 7am on **Saturday 19th May**.

For logistical reasons, the Flame will be carried in a truck for a great part of its journey through Cornwall. There are just 20 communities where the Flame will be taken out of the truck and carried, hand to hand, and Saltash is extremely fortunate to have been selected as one of those 20 communities. Neither the timing nor the exact details of its route have been released for security reasons, but we expect the Flame to arrive here at around 6pm and we know it will cross the Tamar Bridge.

It is a thrilling, historic occasion, and in conjunction with various community groups Saltash Town Council is busily planning a range of projects. From a football tournament in Saltmill to an arts project to create batik banners there will be plenty for everyone. On the day itself children will be given an opportunity to participate in taster sessions of various sports in the 'Passport to Sport'. USE YOUR LOCAL LIBRARY!

Saltash has one of the best libraries in Cornwall, used by up to 450 people each day yet many Saltash residents remain unaware of the wide range of services available.

- The library welcomes new members you can get a library card in minutes, simply by providing proof of your address.
- The library card entitles you to borrow up to 18 books or audio books at a time, for up to three weeks books can be renewed online or by a 24 hour phone line. Your card gives access to books held at libraries throughout Cornwall, and staff will be pleased to arrange reservations at a cost of 75p per item.
- The library has 5 computers with printing facilities –all members are entitled to free use for half an hour, and concessions are available.
- Like many towns in Cornwall, the Library also acts as a One Stop Shop for matters relating to Cornwall Council.
 Trained staff will be pleased to help Saltash residents on a diverse range of services to mention but a few, bus passes and disabled parking badges, housing register and benefit issues, payment of council rent and council tax, clearance of fly tipped rubbish and abandoned vehicles, and the supply of recycling bags.

Saltash Library is a friendly, vibrant place, much loved and valued by regular users. It also offers some surprising services:

- In case you need to talk to one of the four Cornwall Councillors representing Saltash, they take turns in holding an open surgery every Saturday morning.
- Each Tuesday morning, up to 50 young mothers and toddlers enjoy a sing-along of children's favourites with David and his guitar.
- There is a popular Knit and Natter group on Tuesday afternoons, from 1pm 3pm.
- Volunteer Cornwall meet at the Library on the last Friday morning of the month.
- A Scrabble Club meets on Monday afternoons, and would welcome new members.
- There are several reading groups, and occasional visits by Jazz, the Therapy Dog and an expert from Bearnes Auctioneers, who can value your antiques.

THE DIAMOND JUBILEE AND BEATING THE BOUNDS 2012

To celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in June, Saltash Town Council has plans to mark the occasion in style!

- On **Sunday June 3rd**, we will be holding a Picnic in the Park again in Longstone Park, similar to the event staged for the recent Royal Wedding. There will be stalls, games, music and children's entertainers, organised by Councillors Hilary Frank and Merryn Killeya.
- On **Bank Holiday Monday**, **June 4**th (the actual Jubilee Day), we will be repeating the highly successful Beating the Bounds Walk, last held two years ago. This a walk with a difference, since the southern boundary of Saltash is the Lynher river!

The plan is to set off at about noon (from the Waterside by bus up to Carkeel or meet at Waitrose). We then walk down to Moditonham Quay on the Tamar, and follow minor roads and footpaths through Botus Fleming, crossing the A388 at the Holland Inn at Hatt. The route continues over the fields to Notter Bridge.

Along the way, the current Mayor and dignitaries may well be "bounced" on the various boundary stones that mark the boundaries of Saltash!

The walkers, led by Councillor Peter Clements and Martin Lister, will be collected by coach there and taken to the quay at St Germans, where they will embark on the "Plymouth Belle" at high tide, for a pleasurable cruise along the Lynher and back to Saltash.

Capacity for the Bounds Walk is limited to 60-80 people (the capacity of the boat) and based on experience, demand will be high. The cost will probably be £10 per person, to cover the costs of hiring the coach and the "Plymouth Belle".

Question 1...What is this all about ?,.."the people came so fast....both men and horses were so brutish...they leapt in like dogs....it became quite a battle to get in first by fair means or foul "

Going shopping in Plymouth in the old days? This was the (daily) Waterside fight to get a seat on the rowed ferry, told by a visitor in 1760. In 1832 the first steam ferry took over.

Question 2: What is this about?"the animal carcasses were brought in, then skinned and cut up, they were treated in pits, scraped and hung out to dry. Where did it take place? You have probably driven past lots of times!

This was the Saltash Tanyard at the bottom of Fairmead Road on the left as you go down. A long dark building on the corner of Burraton Coombe, now flats. Must have been a smelly place. All the tanned leather was sent up country by rail. Run by the Nancarrow family.

Traffic Road Orders

Cornwall Council are implementing a number of new Traffic Road Orders in Saltash in the first quarter of 2012. These will be in Fore Street, Belle Vue Road, Glebe Avenue, Taylor Road, Berry Park and St Stephens Road and will address a variety of ongoing problems such as access and congestion issues caused by inappropriate parking and use as a shortcut. A disabled parking bay will also be installed at Berry Park.

In addition, a consultation is about to be held regarding a proposed one way system for Barkers Hill, from Back Hill to St Stephen's Church.
