Saltash Remembers

A new and innovative Saltash Town Council War Memorial and Peace Garden is to be opened in Alexandra Square on Sunday 22nd November at 3pm. The Garden, which is believed to be the first of its kind in the South West. is dedicated to those who have lost their lives in war and conflict.

Both the First and Second World Wars will be commemorated by two specially designed wrought iron benches. There will also be a large circular bench made from recycled materials, with a cherry blossom tree at the centre. The flower bed spaces will be filled with beautiful blooms - one in the town colours of red. white, blue and vellow; and the other

with blue and white bedding plants depicting waves and surrounding a sailing boat. Both beds will be planted with poppies in Spring, creating a poignant environment for reflection.

Notice boards will include rare historic photos of troops departing for WW1 from Saltash Railway Station and Saltash Ferry and being waved off by their loved ones (pictured here). Other photos on display will show

A Town Councillor Vacancy has been announced in the Saltash East Ward. If you live in the East Ward and would like an election to be able to vote for who fills this role, write to the Returning Officer of Cornwall Council at the Council Offices, St Austell One-Stop Shop, 39 Penwinnick Road, St Austell PL25 5DR. Ten or more written requests are needed to fill the vacancy by election, otherwise the Councillor position will be co-opted - meaning that Council members will recruit, following an interview process of those who've put themselves forward for the role.

The opening event will comprise a short outdoor Memorial Service and a dove release to symbolise peace. The Memorial is to be opened by Mr Barry Brooking as a representative of the families of Saltash who lost relatives. Barry served in the Royal Navy and Royal Marines Commando and is the grandson of

> Francis Brooking, one of the six Saltash Auxiliary firemen killed in the Blitz in Plymouth in 1941.

Councillor Mrs Sue Hooper, who initiated the project and leads the Working Party on behalf of Saltash Town Council said: "Saltash has always had a strong sense of community and history. In the last few years we have celebrated our Cornish identity with the Cornish Cross, a talking sculpture of Ann Glanville – one of our famous daughters – and even a representation of a First World War trench from a passageway at the Saltash Heritage Museum. This Garden will help ensure we do not forget those who made the supreme sacrifice and we can remember them and hope for peace in the future in a guiet and pleasant environment."

What project or initiative are you most proud of being involved with since becoming a Saltash Councillor?
