The local Surfers Against Sewage team...

 lead events in the community such as beach cleans and fundraisers.

• Inspired thirteen businesses in Penzance to remove three or more single-use-plastic items. Some of these items have been removed completely and others have been swapped out for eco-friendly alternatives.

We looked into what these could be...

 A steering group has been set up to continue the work of developing 'Plastic Free Coastlines' and to think of more ways to protect our planet.

1. Do you use plastic bags?

Yes 12

One shop was using up their stock.

Four of the shops used biodegradable bags.

One shop used bags made from recycled plastic.

One shop used paper bags only.

The larger stores used 'bags for life' and will replace them when they break.

2. How much plastic do you use and what types of plastic do you use?

"We use paper bags and the only plastic that we use is our shampoo bottles."

"Around 80% of our stock is packed in plastic."

"We use plastic bags and containers to freeze our food but we re-use these." "As little as we can but some of our meat is wrapped in plastic to keep it fresh."



"We use cellophane to wrap our flowers at the moment but we are looking at using fabric instead of plastic as we use a lot of plastic in this job"

> "Quite a bit because the pots that our fish are delivered in are made from plastic but some of them now are biodegradable."

"Some bottles are plastic and we have plastic bags but we have now swapped to using paper straws and boxes for our food so this is much better for the planet."

"We don't use any plastic."

"A lot!"

"A lot of products already have plastic on them when they come into the shop so we can't do anything about it."

3. Do you recycle your plastic if it is not single use?

"We try to, yes!"

'At home we do but as a business they won't collect the rubbish from us. There is no facility and we have to pay for it, if it was collected then we would love to recycle plastics."

"We recycle if we can but not everything."

"No, we only recycle cardboard. We need to get better at it."





"We put all of our plastic into a bailer where it is squashed and then we send it to a recycling centre."

"All of our plastic is sent back to the depot to be recycled"



"We do recycle everything we can."

"We try to but some of the plastics we use are nonrecyclable."



4. What do you think about plastic and the damage it is doing to our planet?

Every person we spoke to said that they thought that the plastic problem needed to be addressed. They explained how they thought that plastic was damaging our planet...

Dear Year Two,

Thank you so much for your letter - It is great to hear that you want to see Torpoint become a plastic free town!

According to a piece of law called the Environmental Protection Act 1990, it is up to businesses to organise for someone to pick up their rubbish and recycling. There are lots of waste collection companies that do this, and usually it is no more expensive to recycle than to have rubbish taken away.

However according to Surfers Against Sewage who run the Plastic Free Communities campaign, to become plastic free, it is as much about reducing the plastic which businesses use as well as the recycling.

For example, cafes could use paper instead of plastic straws, sell less bottled water, avoid plastic wrapping and instead of offering plastic bags, using paper bags instead.

As a class, there's lots you could be doing in your communities with your teachers to see a plastic free Torpoint.

- Instead of using bottled drinks, try bringing your own refillable bottle
- Organise a litter pick in your community, you can borrow the equipment (such as the litter grabbers) from www.cleancornwall.org for free!
- Learn more about what happens to your recycling by arranging a visit to the Mixed Recycling Facility in Bodmin, or see what happens to your general waste by organising a visit to the Cornwall Energy Recovery Centre in St Dennis. You can ask your teacher to get in touch with a lovely lady called Emma who would be more than happy to show you around. (Her email is emma.emmer:s@suez.com / telephone: 01726 824488) These visits are free and they will pay for the travel costs.
