<u>Homelessness</u>

Homelessness is complex and often reflects other vulnerabilities or circumstances related to health, justice or social services. Successful homelessness strategies require all public services to contribute in a way that recognises the personal needs, strengths and assets of every household.

Homelessness can affect anyone at any time. Homelessness means not having a home. You are considered homeless if you have nowhere to stay and are living on the streets - but you can also be homeless even if you have a roof over your head. Homelessness can often reflect other vulnerabilities or circumstances related to health, justice or social services. Homelessness often results from a combination of events such as relationship breakdown, debt, adverse experiences in childhood and through ill health.

Cornwall's current <u>Homelessness Strategy</u> runs until March 2020 and needs reviewing in light of recent legislative and other changes. The Council's <u>Homelessness</u> <u>Services</u> are managed through Cornwall Housing Ltd.
